Friends,

The Season of Advent (the word itself basically means "coming") begins on November 27th. For me, the catch word is "prepare". During Advent, I believe we need to prepare ourselves for Christmas Day, for the birth of Jesus Christ. It is a time when we consider what it means to us individually, to us as a congregation, and to the greater community, that God took on flesh and came and lived with us. I don't think it's faithful to just run scatterbrained through December, bouncing from one event to another, jamming in shopping trips, stressing about gift ideas, and then just sort of wind up on the morning of the 25th expecting it to be a sacred and beautiful event. I believe that if we are more intentional about preparing for that day — the birth, the person — then the season would be more fulfilling, and Christmas Day would be more meaningful.

You see, I believe it would be great if we treated the season of Advent much more like the season of Lent. It seems that in Lent we are significantly more intentional about prayer, fasting, studying, worshipping — all ways to prepare for Easter. We actually have a whole week, Holy Week, designed to prepare us for Easter Day. What if we put that kind of intentionality into Advent? What if we prayed more intentionally; fasted once or twice in the midst of the indulgence of the season? What if, everyday, we completed the following sentence: Jesus is _____ ... or Christmas is _____ ... and kept our sentences in a journal? If we are celebrating God come to earth in Jesus Christ, what if during Advent we memorized something he said? What if during Advent we did something he did — 1 thing every week? What if once per week during Advent we "sat down with Jesus" and talked to him — just like he was there?

So, I encourage you to take the season of Advent this year and set aside some quiet, thoughtful time, either daily or weekly, to consider what the reality of God Incarnate (in the flesh) has meant in your life. Consider the blessings that come from knowing the love of God in your life. I am willing to guarantee that if we were to do these things during December, that the month would not be as stressful and difficult; I guarantee we would have more peace; and I guarantee that Christmas morning would be sacred and Holy and beautiful, like you have never experienced. It's worth a try. I'm doing it.

SPENCERPORT ECUMENICAL FOOD SHELF

The Spencerport Ecumenical Food Shelf is a spinoff of the Spencerport Ecumenical Ministries (a group of 10 participating churches in our community). It has a Board of Directors staffed by volunteers from area churches. It collects food and household items through various churches, businesses, school groups, and other charitable organizations in the area. Items are stocked at Parma Baptist Church.

Cash donations are used to purchase store gift cards that will go out with each boxed delivery so that an individual/family may purchase fresh/perishable items.

Persons/families in need of food may call Steve Brown (277-4917), who will take information as to the number of people in the family, and age groups in order to figure out amount of food needed. Individuals or families are eligible to receive deliveries every 60 days (or 4 times a year). If/when more assistance is needed, information on how to apply for food stamps, school meal programs, etc. will be made available.

Persons/Families receiving help from the Food Shelf are also eligible for Thanksgiving baskets, and will be referred to Cartons for Christmas group for Christmas baskets.

The Food Shelf does its stocking of shelves every Thursday from 9 to 11am, if you are interested in volunteering. Deliveries are made on an as-needed basis using a pool of drivers headed by Elaine Hill. If you would like to be added to this list, you should call 293-1415.





WOMEN'S BIBLE STUDY PROJECT

"Thank you for your generous contribution of several boxes of pill bottles for our program. Pill bottles prepared as described on our website are blended with other medical supplies and shipped to hospitals and clinics in developing countries where even a bar of soap is too precious to use except in the most extreme

circumstances. The bottles provide a more hygienic form of dispensing and a safer receptacle for scarce and valuable medicines. Unprepared pill bottles are shredded and recycled for cash which goes back to support our programs and also helps save the environment by reducing the amount of waste deposited into landfills. *All pill bottles are valuable, appreciated, and helpful to our work*.

In 2015, Matthew 25 shipped 3,542 pallets (1,911,192 pounds) of medical supplies including bottles to locations such as Antigua, Commonwealth of Independent States, Dominica, Dominican Republic, El Salvador, Grenada, Guatemala, Guyana, Ghana, Haiti, Honduras, Jamaica, and Nicaragua. Medical supplies include pill bottles as well as other first aid, surgical, treatment, and orthopedic items. In 2015, Matthew 25 recycled 66,347 pounds of chips and received \$1,685 in compensation for the recycling of the shredded pill bottles. These reimbursements provide additional funding for our programs.

We appreciate your support and diligence! We will gratefully accept any pill bottles you send to us in the future. Thank you again for all your help and your continuing support of this program. Joodi Archer, Development and Media Director, Matthew 25 Ministries"

Women's Bible Study has been collecting, cleaning, packaging and sending used pill bottles to Matthew 25 Ministries since early this year. So far, we have sent over 2,500 bottles and have more to send soon! Thank you all for your bottles, and continue to drop them off in the box on the Mission Table.
